# Miracles thanks students at Keystone Elementary for donating a therapeutic riding scholarship!

We are so grateful to Samantha Happel and students from Keystone Elementary in Keystone, Iowa for supporting Miracles in Motion. Here's Samantha's own words describing their "passion" project:

"I am a first grade teacher at Keystone Elementary, located in Keystone, Iowa. Throughout the first two weeks of February, students in Kindergarten through 3<sup>rd</sup> grade participated in passion projects in which teachers chose a passion to share with students. Students chose which passion they wanted to learn more about and participated in research and project-based learning with that teacher. My group's area of focus was horses.

"During our time together, the students in my group learned about basic horse anatomy, uses throughout history, different horse breeds, and famous horses. Through their research, they found more information about equine therapy. I shared with them my experiences with (Miracles in Motion) as a side walker for a short time while I was in college, and we checked out your website and read about what you do, your horses, and also watched the short video. The students were inspired to raise money to help your organization! We organized covered wagon rides for students and staff at Keystone Elementary to promote our fundraiser. We created a short commercial and shared it with students and staff. Each student brought \$1 (for rides), and staff brought \$5 to wear jeans for one day! (Teachers love their jeans!)"

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Covered wagon rides were provided by Harp Farms of Ladora, lowa. The students dressed like cowboys and cowgirls. In addition to learning more about horses and seeing draft horses up close and personal, the students raised \$240 for Miracles! This is such an inspired project. Thanks to Ms. Happel, Harp Farms, Keystone Elementary (part of Benton Community) and most of all thanks to the students for providing a scholarship for a therapeutic riding student!

Miracles MVECS (Military Veterans Equine Care Squad) Open House is scheduled for Saturday, March 17<sup>th</sup>, at the Miracles farm near Swisher. Plan on learning more about how we work with veterans and their spouses to learn about horses and their care, as well as riding opportunities. This year, we will be building on successes of last year. We hope that our returning students are excited and ready to ride. We also hope that everyone reading this will pass it on to parents of kids with disabilities who may want to get their children involved.

Finally, our program for veterans (MVECS) is in its second year. We received a grant from PATH to make this project accessible to veterans. Graduates of this program have had high praise for what a difference MVECS has made in their lives.

# Therapeutic Riding Class schedule announced

### The story behind the photo

Ten years ago, when Miracles was celebrating 20 years, an idea was floated to dress horses up in "tuxes" to take a photo for a celebration poster. Enter Sheri Seggerman, a volunteer with both horse experience and a photographer's eye. The day of the photo session was beautiful – blue skies, no wind and enthusiastic volunteers to help with the project. An area in the outdoor arena was defined with boxes, barrels and poles to attempt to corral the four horses for the shot. The goal was all four horses lined up together, with their bowtie/tuxes on and NO HALTERS (to which Sheri said "really"!!!) Anyone who has tried to take photos of animals knows how tricky this was going to be - one would back out of the box; one would try and chew the bowtie, requiring a run to the house for repairs; one would get annoyed with the next horse over and let him know "who was boss". And, of course, seeking perfection, Sheri wanted all four to have their ears perked up for the classic horse look as well as the light from behind so there would be no shadows on the horses' faces. It all came together when Sheri got down on the ground and someone used a "horse whinny" on their cell phone to get all four to swivel their ears forward in interest. Click – the shot was done. And a great shot it is, all without the use of Photoshop!
